GAIN OR LOSS

We are living in a world where the inhabitants are on a mad rush for gain. As it is with the nations on a whole, so it is with individuals; everybody seems to be busy in getting all that can be gotten from this sin-cursed world. Whether this will eventually bring gain or loss, is a question of paramount importance.

In every well managed business enterprise there is a time set for an inventory; this is to ascertain whether the business is gaining or losing. If gaining, efforts will be made to maintain the highest standard of efficiency in order to gain more. If losing it means a discontinuation of business or a radical change in its management in order to save it from total wreck.

There are two walks of life (temporal and spiritual) in which mankind is engaged in business; and what applies to the temporal also applies to the spiritual. Why should we on the contrary consider the latter of less importance, thus allowing the spiritual phase to suffer bankruptcy? While our present needs are supplied by the temporal things of this life, many of these things conflict with the spiritual; this being so, he who will enter into business with Christ, must heed His injunction given to His disciples and to the people nineteen centuries ago as recorded in Mark 8:34, which reads: "Whosoever

will come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." Here is the stumbling stone of self-denial over which the stubborn, unconverted heart falls; and in fact no one can make this step of self-denial except he takes an inventory of his life and sees that all his earthly pursuits without Christ are precipitating a failure. There may be prosperity here but this is transitory. Our Saviour asked "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" Mat. 16:26. This twofold question evidently shows that man's life is invaluable as compared with the material things of this world and should be given first consideration, for some day these things will pass away.

"The whole creation," says Paul, "groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now . . . waiting for the adoption to-wit, the redemption of our body.' Rom. 8:22, 23. From the above it will be seen that the work of final redemption will one day take place; only he who now scrutinizes himself in the light of God's Word and sees that he is losing his spiritual equilibrium, then makes the step toward self-denial will be profited when the final redemption is effected. This was what the great apostle did.

Turning to Phil. 3:7, 8, we read his wonderful declaration as follows: "But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ. Yea doubtless I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for whom I suffered the loss of these things...that I may win Christ."

Reader, do you suppose that Paul was complaining over his losses and thus was inviting the of others? Rather he was making a declaration of his investment in the Lord—an investment in which he will one day share big dividends. Let us observe that Paul was professedly a godly man (like many of us today), but his way was so broad that it admitted of all that he then possessed. His genealogy, pharisaical pride, worldly honor and ambitions crowded his spiritual pathway and left no way for his development. But when he found Christ, the "pearl of great price," he entered into business contract with Him, suffering the loss of these things for something more excellent in order that he may win Him. Oh that all may make this wonderful step toward self-denial and sacrifice!

The Inexorable Way

The way of self-denial is based on implicit faith in God. No one without faith can deny himself to make this step; so do not try to do so without having at least a little faith. First, believe in the existence of God who is God indeed: this is the exact meaning of the phraseology of Heb. 11:6, which reads, "For he that cometh to God must believe that He is (God) and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." Really, many to whom this proposition of self-denial is put can not accept it; and though not willingly rejecting it, lacks faith to believe that God is God indeed: they will not trust Him to the extent of sacrificing their worldly gains even though such a course jeopardizes their souls.

Examples of Faith
Those who desire to trust God and take Him at His Word will find encouraging examples in the lives of men and women who trusted Him in days of yore and found Him true. The apostle calls this number a "cloud of witnesses." The reader is recommended to read Heb. Ch. 11, after which if he desires to make the step, let him do so by faith, he will be victorious even as those mentioned in this

chapter.

Now that you have started on the way of self-denial the question that will often confront you is "Am I gaining or losing?" The devil will always bring before your mind the "kingdoms of this world and the glories of them." He will try to make you realize how unwise you are in sacrificing for Jesus: if he tempted Him (Jesus) with these things he will also tempt But remember always that God is God and this knowledge will bring to you the blessed assurance that He will reward you for the sacrifices your allegiance to Him has led you to make. Prove Him now by experiment as it is your privilege to do (Mal. 3:10) and He'll be found faithful. In the language of the Psalmist, "O taste and see that the Lord is good: blessed is the man that trusteth in Him." Ps. 34:8.

THE SEVEN LAST PLAGUES

"In the fifteenth and sixteenth chapters of the book of Revelation there are enumerated the seven last plagues which are to be poured out upon the earth. Of these it is written that 'in them is filled up the wrath of God.' In other words when they begin to fall there is no more mercy or forgiveness for men and women. Probation will have closed and the fate of all living will have been decided for eternity. Elsewhere they are styled, 'the wine of the wrath of God,' the wrath of God-'without mixture,' 'in the cup of his indignation.' They are, to borrow the language of the prophet Jeremiah, 'the wine cup of His fury.' They are also said to be 'full of the wrath of God.' See Rev. 14:10; Jer. 25:15; Rev. 15:7.

"Since, therefore, these plagues are 'full of the wrath of God' and since that wrath is said to be 'without mixture' it is clear that there cannot possibly by any mercy, forgiveness, probation, or salvation mixed up with the wrath which they contain. Often in Scripture story divine wrath, commingled with mercy, has been visited upon men. The chastisement was to lead men to repentence.

"But with the 'seven last plagues' it is clearly different. Once they begin to fall there cannot possibly be any mercy or salvation for any man. All the dwellers upon earth who live during the time of these plagues must make sure of salvation before the plague angels start upon their mission.

"That the time of these visitations is approaching is evident from many prophecies; but in the sixth plague evidence is given that enables us to see how present day events are shaping

toward the end.

"Under the sixth plague will come the battle of the kings of the earth, and of the East and the whole earth. The conflict centers around the destruction of the Turkish Empire, or drying up of that Power which is described by Daniel as the 'king of the North,' and by the Revelator as the 'great river Euphrates,' the nation occupying the territory formerly occupied by that general who absorbed the

northern part of Alexander the Great's mighty empire.

"Today the Triple Entente has declared that it will be satisfied with nothing short of the extinction of Turkey as a European power. This is only a preliminary step to the ultimate and complete destruction of the Ottoman Empire as any sort of a Power. We are standing in the shadow of that event—an event which spells the end of the old world and the setting up of the kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. 'Blessed is he that watcheth, and keepeth his garments lest he walk naked, and they see his shame'."
